


- \$125,000 a year, for 5 years
- Federal grant, created by the Drug-Free Communities Act of 1997
- From the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP)  
Day-to-day management by CDC

# Two Goals of The DFC Support Program

- ❑ **Establish and strengthen collaboration** among communities, public and private non-profit agencies, as well as federal, state, local, and tribal governments to support the efforts of community coalitions working to prevent and reduce substance abuse among youth.
- ❑ **Reduce substance abuse** among youth and, over time, reduce substance abuse among adults by addressing the factors in a community that increase the risk of substance abuse and promoting the factors that minimize the risk of substance abuse.

# Lending Library

## DBHR Lending Library Process

1. Coalition Coordinator makes a request to the Prevention System Manager they work with for the curriculum they would like to check out.
2. The Prevention System Manager coordinates a response to the request with headquarters staff including the following information:
  - If the curriculum is currently available, a determination will be made when and how the materials can be delivered to the requesting Coalition Coordinator.
  - If curriculum is currently checked out, the number of people on the waiting list will be identified, an approximate wait time will be determined, and the name of the coordinator making the current request will be added to the wait list in the order received with the date of the request noted.
  - The system manager will let the coordinator know the status of the request and the approximate delivery date and means.
3. The amount of time materials may be checked out is a total of three weeks, including delivery time, to ensure access to materials by others.




# 2020 Survey Overview

  - 1 survey was taken in Chinese (only one question answered)


## Respondents are 78% female





## 41% of respondents are parents/guardians

# 2021 Legislative Update

- 2021 Regular Session Continues
- Third Milestone Reached: March 9<sup>th</sup>. Bills need to be out of the house of origin.
- Next Milestone:
  - March 26<sup>th</sup>. **The last day bills from the opposite house can be voted out of a policy committee except House fiscal committees and Senate Ways & Means and Transportation committees.**
- DBHR bills tracking –
  - (25) Bills - Do Pass for 1<sup>st</sup> Cutoff
  - (20) Bills – Do Pass for 2<sup>nd</sup> Cutoff
  - (17) Bills – Do Pass for 3<sup>rd</sup> Cutoff/3<sup>rd</sup> Milestone
  - (2) Bills – Potential Pathways



### PRIMORDIAL PREVENTION

Education for larger population of the state, youth and families

### PRIMARY PREVENTION

Supporting youth and families prior to system involvement to reduce risk of housing instability for youth

### EARLY SECONDARY PREVENTION

Early system (CPS or Juvenile or Criminal Justice) interaction that does not lead to out of home placement or incarceration.

### LATER SECONDARY PREVENTION

Preventing deeper system involvement and housing instability.

### TERTIARY PREVENTION

Preventing housing instability for those exiting the system

Ensuring those who are experiencing homelessness move quickly into safe and stable housing and receive appropriate supports




# Of youth who experiences homelessness after exit from a system

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- 77% had an indication of a Substance Use Disorder
  - 64% had a co-occurring mental illness and SUD
- 84% had experienced arrest or been charged with a crime.

# Piloting preventing youth homelessness with CPWI communities

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- Not DBHR funding
- If there is interest, the team will work to figure out funding.
- Target population 12-24 years.
- Outcomes
  - Educational attainment
  - No criminal justice involvement
  - Stable housing
  - No SUD



# Opportunity 1

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- Family Reconciliation Services (FRS) & CPWI as a mechanism for families to reduce barriers and increase awareness of, and access to, services.
- Shift services to the community and out of child welfare
- Piloting a two generational mentoring model to prevent family conflict and child welfare involvement



# Pilot 2

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- **Parents of adolescent support network**
  - Cohort based parent support with a facilitator to discuss topics such as youth SUD, LGBTQ2 issues, navigating behavioral health challenges/ intellectual or developmental disabilities with their young person.
  - Receive tools to navigate conflict and difficult conversations.



## Pilot 3

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- Screening and needs assessment of all young people for risk factors associated with housing instability.
- Early identification and connecting with resources.

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

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


**Figure 2.** Youth who are black *and* LGBTQ reported the highest rates of homelessness
