Legislature

School Board

Create Laws & Rules Public School Systems must follow

Elected by voters to set goals, conduct strategic planning, hire and oversee the superintendent, adopt the school district budget and create policy.

Superintendent

Hired by the school board to manage the school district.

Principal

Manages staff and student body and day-to-day operations of the school.

Teachers

Credentialed in content, teaches: creates lesson plans/teaches assigned curricu prepare for (state) assessment assigned to committee work

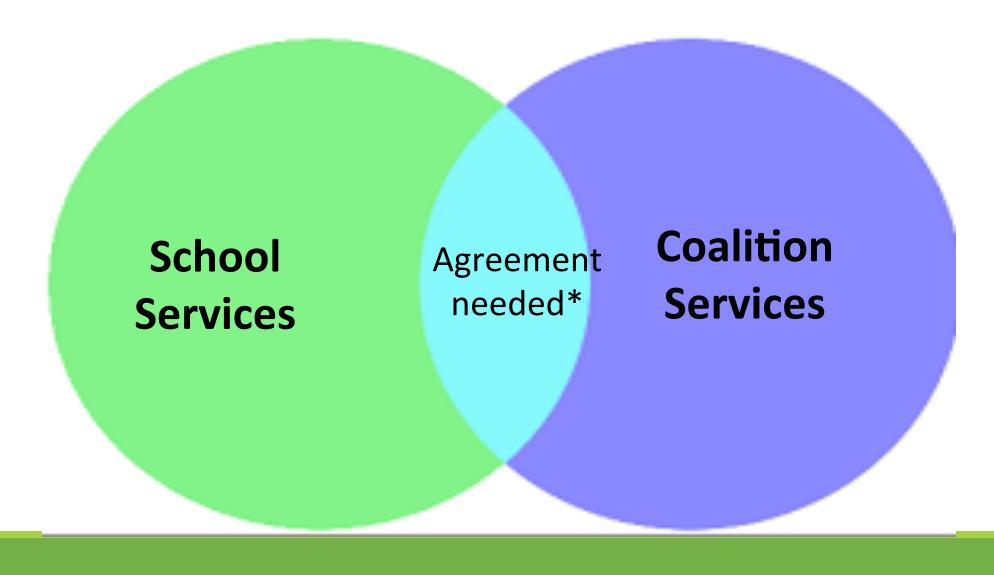


Each school site has adaptations with the understanding that F SUCCESS isn't one-sizall. Different schools struggle with different of this model for different school might be struggle with?

It's a fine line

- ESD Employee/Embedded School Staff
 - P/I staff have two sets of policy and procedure to adhere to.
 - P/I staff have school obligations (staff meetings, back-to-school nights, field trips, school expectations and needs)
 - P/I staff also have ESD obligations (staff meetings, reporting, grant requirements)

*****ESDs do not have enforcement authority over schools; ESDs provide support to schools.

Common Challenges

Principal says won't pull kids out during class time

Not receiving referral (eg. coordination challenges, low trust of services, gatekeeper in hierarchy)

Discipline policies/practices not optimal

Office space, confidential space

Connecting with the team

History of negative experiences with other (school-based)

Direct Services

How does the coalition fit?

Coordinators are:

- -A resource (school/family engagement, programming —think how does this programmeet a need of an initiative)
- -A connection to families and community members
- -A connection to substance use and abuse resources

Important things to remember when working with schools:

- -How you sell it MATTERS! "To me, job titles don't matter. Everyone is in sales. It's the only way we stay in business." Harvey Mackay
- THEY'RE BUSY! The squeaky wheel gets the grease...sometimes your phone call or email gets lost or forgotten, it often isn't personal and following up (and how you follow up) can make all the difference.
- -If a school sees you as an asset and as taking something off their plate rather than adding to it, you will be more successful.
